


The Criminal Justice System in the U.S. and African Americans




System Description

- In a country where crime is actually declining, incarceration rates are still steadily increasing
 - "No other country in the world incarcerates such an astonishing percentage of its racial or ethnic minorities [as the U.S.]." (*New Jim Crow*, Alexander, 2010)
 - Spending on prisons and jails has increased at triple the rate of spending on Pre-K-12 public education in the last thirty years (Anderson 2018)
 - There is a 100-1 ratio in minimum sentencing for crack cocaine vs. powder cocaine (Anderson 2018)




